How did you serve the Order before becoming Section Chief

Camp Spotlight: The East Carolina Scout Reservation

Located on the Pamlico River, East Carolina Scout Reservation is home to Camp Boddie, the official summer camp of the East Carolina Council, as well as Pamlico Sea Base, ECC's very own High Adventure base. Over the summer, Camp Boddie offers a wide Variety of Programs for scouts of all ages and ability levels.

The Camp boasts a large waterfront area where scouts can earn various aquatic merit badges, or enjoy afternoon sessions of tubing or hydro sliding. Just off of the water front, the PotashCorp. Ecology Lodge offers a multitude of merit badges focused on ecology, conservation and leave no trace. In recent years the camp has offered a new program geared toward older scouts; the Backwoodsman program is a weeklong program that takes place in Camp Bodie's wilderness area. Scouts who take part in the Backwoodsman program will learn about traditional pioneering techniques as well as the history and ecology of the land that makes up the East Carolina Scout reservation. Spaces for this program are limited and spots fill up quickly!

Just down the road from camp Boddie is Pamlico Sea Base, where scouts from all over the country come for an opportunity to explore the coastal waters of North Carolina. PSB offers many sailing programs, from small sun fish to our 72 ft. schooner; the Jeanie B. PSB also offers a Jet Ski program as well as cycling and kayaking programs that take scouts on a tour of the Pamlico Sound and the Outer Banks. Check out the link below to learn more.
